


ANNUAL BAT COUNTS

The GA DNR Bat Roost Monitoring
Project is designed to collect data
for two summer periods. We want
participants to count bats before
and after pups are born each year.

2021-2022 RESULTS

Overall, counts were higher in 2022, even with fewer sites. However, because of a heat wave in July, many bats appear to have left roosts earlier so the late summer counts were lower.




BATS OF GEORGIA

Georgia is home to 16 species of bats that forage on flying insects, many of which are pests. Big brown bats (left) are the most commonly reported bat roosting in bat houses in Georgia.
